

## Giving shiny love and new hope in a shoebox. What it means and how to do it.

Please, for one moment, imagine you are a young child from a very poor family. Christmas is coming and although you know you will not be receiving any gifts you are still very excited. Imagine now you are a child in one of our Soup Kitchens. It is Christmas time and after a special meal, Father Christmas appears and starts to give out beautifully wrapped Christmas boxes.

Imagine the anticipation when given a Christmas Shoebox. (For many this will be the first "proper" Christmas present they may have had in their lives).

Whilst waiting for your turn you look across the room and watch your friends open their Christmas Shoebox. All the children, indeed everyone is very excited and eagerly, (but carefully so as not to rip the paper), open the lid to reveal a box totally stuffed to the brim with lots of lovely new things; some practical, some to play with, some to wear. The joy, the excitement, is overwhelming.





Your imagination is running wild as a beautifully wrapped Christmas box is passed to you. Initially you just look at it imagining what delights lay inside. Carefully you cut the sellotape and open the lid. Inside, this prettily wrapped box is half filled, not packed to the top, not the same as the others.

Inside lies a well-loved, possibly over loved teddy, a few used crayons with a partly completed colouring book. The best things in the box are a small packet of sweets and a toy given in a Kiddies box from McDonalds. All your excitement has fallen to your boots. You fight to hide your disappointment. Your friends excitedly ask "What did you get in your box?" Fighting back the tears you hold up the few crayons and say, "These are great, I can still use them and the colouring book has some unused pages left".

To fill a box with lovely new things for a child can be expensive, about £15 to £20 and if this is too much why not get together with friends or neighbours and between you make one lovely box brimming with new things.

These children live such grim lives but despite this they are really lovely, as are most of the people in Moldova. They deserve the best we can give. It is so emotional for anyone witnessing the children, (and grannies and grandpas), opening these Christmas boxes. Seeing a child shout with excitement, their eyes filled with tears of joy, is a sight never to be forgotten. These Christmas Shoeboxes are filled with love and give hope to those who receive them.





We do not have a list of items we want you to put in your Christmas box but rather we invite you to decide if you wish to do a box for a girl or boy, or even a granny or grandad. Then look around and find things you feel would be suitable and pack the box. The only thing we do ask is that everything in the box is new.
