From David...

Last Sunday I told the story of Henry Gerecke, the 'minister to monsters', the padre who, in 1945, was given the job of being chaplain to 21 high ranking Nazis during their trial, and for some their execution, at the Nuremburg trials.

I first heard the story when I was a student in Exeter. David Pawson, a prominent Baptist minister and Bible teacher, was the guest speaker at a church there. The story has stayed with me ever since. And I have fact checked it as well just in case it was embellished and have found it to be unnervingly well attested. I have often wondered about the saving work of Christ in those circumstances. Would God really forgive such people?

The power of stories is that they allow us to think, to make choices for ourselves without being told what conclusions we should draw. When Henry Gerecke published his account in 1950, he neither declared those Nazis as beyond redemption, nor as forgiven. He left that with the Lord but told the story. Whether salvation extends to such is for us to think on. Them forgiven? Really? Try telling that to the few surviving victims and families of victims.

The parables of Jesus have that same power to prompt us to think and help us make choices without telling us exactly what to think. And so when we see someone pushed around at work, we are questioned by the Good Samaritan parable, or when we hear

Christians griping in church, up pops the Prodigal Sons parable and asks if they (or we) need to see ourselves as the older brother.

At Christmas, as Easter, a greater narrative is told and asks us to consider how extravagant is the goodness of God. How is it changing how you live?

Something really sweet happened today.

I'll explain it.

For a while, I have been praying and searching for direction in my faith, an affirmation if you like. I know this may sound crazy to some of you, but I have real questions, all the time!

I think that it is in and with our church that we ought to be able to speak about such things, but we don't seem to. Without going too deep, I listened to an eloquent atheist and found that some of his questions were mine also. I watched an American preacher being interviewed. He was justifying his enormous wealth and flamboyant lifestyle while simultaneously showing disdain for his fellow humans. I asked God, how can this be?

I am praying and studying John's letters (1-4). I am reading a book about someone who had a near-death experience and says she understands Heaven. I am ploughing through another (recommended book) 'How to Read the Bible for All Its Worth'. Some days I am firm in my faith in Jesus and other days I feel guilty. I hate this guilty feeling because I don't really understand it and I don't want it.

Today, the weather is awful, and I needed to listen to some human voices for company, so I listened to a podcast about Religion (in our politics, in our churches and in our society). The focus was on the UK. I listened to a woman speak about her experience of being a Christian and how sometimes it all slips out of focus. A bit like at the Opticians when they test your eyes with different lenses, you get that temporary blur before everything slides back into focus again.

What heartened me most is that she went on to say that when she feels that way (doubtful) she gives thanks to God that she feels it among people who collectively look grief, death, disappointment, and defeat in the face, and on an intentional regular basis, together. Who talk about their weaknesses, together. Who look forward to hope, but hope that still bears scars, that is not triumphalist, narrow, or shallow. That, she said, is a wonderful place to be. I agree, because fellowship is important and faith isn't a feeling, it is truth. When we accept Jesus, we choose to walk in the truth.

So, what was sweet was to further understand that our Christian life is a journey of discovery. We discover ourselves and we discover others, but above all, we discover Almighty God and the ways in which he speaks to us so that we might learn, when our trust is weakened, to be faithful unto the end.
