

From the Pastor...

Certainty is what we want. Direct answers, clear forecasts. We want to know. When will we reach Covid herd immunity, will I be OK, when will we all be getting back to normal?

The problem is, life isn't like that, is it? So much uncertainty. So many big questions unanswerable. And the Lord doesn't often let know what is coming up. But the Lord gives us the way to live, following Jesus, but God does not operate like a celestial Google, giving answers on demand.

Jesus didn't answer everything in a straightforward way. Strangely, He often spoke in veiled terms, using parables and short sayings which raised even more questions. What He did was to get us to think deeper, to feel our way through the questions and in the struggle grow in insight. So maybe uncertainty, in the hands of God, can be useful in our growth in faith.

So we are left having to learn to live with uncertainty and live with the questions. And knowing how Jesus worked with the disciples, steering them though how to live despite the uncertainty, we know that the Spirit is with us as we tread the unpredictable pathways of life.

Don't look at the signs! Find the love!

John 4:43 - 54

Exeter is a long-established city; there is evidence of the settlement from about 250 B.C. The Romans established a base there in about A.D. 45. From that time on Exeter was prominent amongst the cities of England as a port and with its great cathedral and university.

Exeter has become such a hub of activity that many kinds of business have set up in it, with the resultant traffic congestion. It can take commuters a long time to travel from the outskirts of the city centre at rush-hour and other busy times.

Imagine that the town planners sit down and they manage to devise a brilliant, new traffic flow system through the city. To make it work, they needed new signage. Because of its heritage, its fame and its beauty, it was decided that nothing but the best, the most fine and well designed signs would do.

The signs are designed and put up but, to their dismay, the planners discover that the traffic congestion is even worse! Everyone is getting out of their cars to stand and admire the wonderful signs rather than follow where the signs are directing.

This is the problem that Jesus was facing. The Word became flesh, but the people were admiring the flesh rather than hearing the Word (verse 48). Jesus despairs as he tells them, "Unless you people see signs and wonders ... you will never believe."

The people wanted signs and wonders, almost as if they wanted a performing animal or a magic show. (V 45) "The Galileans welcomed him. They had seen all that he had done in Jerusalem at the Passover Festival."

They had seen great signs and wonders in Jerusalem, and now wanted to see the same in Galilee. They wanted another show.

In contrast, the royal official, whose son was very ill, believed the word which Jesus spoke to him. He didn't need Jesus to actually go to his son's bedside and "perform a miracle." He was satisfied with the word of Jesus, and believed.

The gospel of John keeps emphasising the distinction between believing because we've seen something and believing on the strength of Jesus' words. In John 20:29. We see Jesus' rebuke to Thomas. "Because you have seen me, you have believed; blessed are those who have not seen, and yet have believed." This is a challenge for each of us today. We are invited to believe in the Word become flesh, not the flesh itself.

We need to keep seeking the Word (Jesus) that is in the flesh, not using the Word to find the flesh.

The signs in the Gospels are there to show us Jesus – they are not there to be marvelled at in their own right.

The miracles of the past and the present are signs placed there to point us towards Jesus and the love of the Father for each one of us. We shouldn't stop to wonder at the miracles – we should move on towards the love of the Father to which those miracles are pointing us.
