Today is the second Sunday in Advent (Advent Sunday).

When Traditionally Christians all over the world light the first candle of the Advent Wreath. But what does it all mean?

The Wreath: The wreath itself means "victory" as Christ's victory over sin so He can save us. The Advent Wreath has 4 or 5 candles that are arranged in a circle symbolizing Christ's eternity, as a circle has no beginning and has no end, it is a symbol for God, who is eternal and thus without beginning or end. The evergreens mean He is "ever with us," they are usually pine branches or holly that are used as a base that represents anticipation, newness, renewal and His everlastingness. The red berries of the holly represent the shedding of Christ's blood. *Thank you Heidi for this lovely painting* of an Advent Wreath

The second candle "CANDLE OF PREPARATION" means His light and preparation. Preparation means to 'get ready'. "Help us to be ready to welcome YOU, O GOD!"

"As it is written in the book of the words of Isaiah the prophet: A voice of one calling in the wilderness, 'Prepare the way for the Lord, make straight paths for him. Every valley shall be filled in, every mountain and hill made low. The crooked roads shall become straight, the rough ways smooth. "And all people will see God's salvation." Luke 3:4-6

Chocolate at Christmas – a message from Christina Greeves

What's your favourite Christmas chocolate? After Eights? A tin of Quality Street? Celebrations? A giant tube of Smarties in your stocking?

None of the companies that make these chocolates can say that all their chocolate has been made without child slavery. That means that whenever you buy chocolate it is highly likely that you are supporting the use of child slaves. I am sure the thought of being involved in what the International Labour Organisation calls 'the worst form of child labour' upsets you as much as it does me. This involves children from as young as 5. They may have been abducted by traffickers, taken far from home and forced to work on cocoa farms, using hazardous pesticides, dangerous tools and with no chance of leaving. Neither they nor their families "earn" anything for this.

Around 60-70% of all cocoa comes from Ghana and the Ivory Coast. A recent 2020 report by NORC from the University of Chicago says that 1.56 *million* children are used as illegal child labour in the cocoa supply chain in these countries. Therefore, most of the chocolate you see in our shops is tainted with this slavery.

To avoid being a part of this shocking treatment of people, look for chocolate with the Fairtrade Mark, chocolate that is Rainforest Alliance Certified or UTZ certified or choose chocolate made by companies on Ethical Manufacturer lists (e.g. at slavefreechocolate.org). These certifications are independently regulated schemes to ensure fairer conditions and wages for all people in the supply chain. Bear in mind that you need to do this for any product containing cocoa, be that the hot chocolate you drink, the chocolate chips you use in your own cookies, chocolate ice cream, biscuits coated in chocolate, tiramisu dusted with cocoa... Some chocolate companies have created their own schemes, e.g. Nestlé Cocoa Plan, Cadbury's Cocoa Life, Lindt Cocoa Farming Programme. It is important to check whether these schemes have been independently verified, and to be aware that, so far, they often only cover a few products the manufacturers make, not all products.

When you are about to buy some chocolate because it's your favourite, because Christmas wouldn't be Christmas without it, because it's on special offer, please stop and think: Has this chocolate cost a child its freedom, its education, its home, its health? Make a choice and choose justice, compassion and freedom from oppression for those that have made it.
